Marquis of Chandos in Parliament 'Agricultural Distress' The outrages of 1829 - 1830 were owing to the distress of the peasantry who were driven to He hoped that such scares would not despair. recur, and that the house would aid him in assisting the farmer, and in comforting and supporting the labourer. The agricultural int. were subjected to many taxes which pressed more severely on them than on other classes of the community. The Noble Lord must be aware there was the duty on Malt, the duty on windows, the duty on horses and the duty on agricultural servants so that these burdens pressed severely on the farmer, in addition to the pressure of poor rates.
