

TO THE EDITOR OF THE NORTHAMPTON HERALD

Sir, - The invitation which your valuable Journal holds out of giving publicity to the conduct of the Railway Company, or its disreputable servants, would be quite sufficient for me without further apology to relate the insults and grievances, of which (if I had time) I could furnish you with a sufficient number of cases, but "*ex uno disce omnes.*" Agnes Peasnall and Lucy Butcher, of this parish, took and paid for their places from Birmingham to Blisworth, on the 2nd of this month, and, on their arriving at Blisworth, they could not obtain their luggage, the fellow insolently saying "he would not stop for any one," and adding coarse language to those two unprotected women. The consequence was, that the luggage (which too was very small) was conveyed on to London or elsewhere, and they were not able to get it till three or four days afterwards.

I have an objection as to my name appearing in print, which will, I hope, be a sufficient apology for my sending this anonymous letter; but, as I have stated the names, you can have no doubt of the fact, and although you may, probably, make a third guess as to who this comes from, I trust you will excuse my not putting myself forward unless circumstances should imperatively demand it.
